STRATEGIC DIRECTION

Napier City Council is continuing to work towards our long-term strategic vision for the city: A vibrant and sustainable city for all.

Achieving this vision would see us providing facilities, services, leadership and opportunity to our community to make Napier the best city in Napier in which to live, work raise a family, and enjoy a safe and satisfying life.

You'll notice a common theme underpinning this plan as you read through it - we're rolling up our sleeves and doing the mahi (work) to bring Napier's infrastructure up to standard and cater for our steadily growing city.

Water remains our number one priority. We're investing and planning ahead to:

resolve colour and taste issues with our drinking water;



ensure our stormwater network can withstand more frequent severe weather events expected as a result of our changing climate, and lessen environmental effects of stormwater discharge into the Ahuriri Estuary; and



address aging elements of our wastewater network, like our 1.5km outfall pipe in Awatoto.

Napier City Council is uniquely positioned to focus on enhancing the wellbeing of our community, whether that be by helping with the basics like housing and community safety, or places to visit including museums, sports facilities and beautiful outdoor spaces. We've planned for projects in this space too to improve our people's connectedness and resilience, like building the Te Pihinga Community Centre in Maraenui.

COMMUNITY WELLBEINGS

Council's role and responsibilities are set out in Local Government Act 2002 (the LGA).

In 2010, the LGA was amended to clarify Council's core role as the provision of three main functions: providing local infrastructure, local public services and performing regulatory enforcement.

In 2019, the Government repealed this focus on core services, and instead reverted to the previous purpose statement:

"The purpose of local government is.... to promote the social, economic, environmental and cultural well-being of communities in the present and for the future"

This change recognises that every council is different and that there is no one-size-fits-all approach. Every council needs discretion and flexibility to decide in consultation with their community the nature and level of services they should provide to improve quality of life.

Decisions no longer need to be based around the question "are we allowed to do this?", but instead "should we do this?".
